



Outdoor heated shelters for stray cats Project created by Danae Blasso

The cold season in Centre County lasts for 3.2 months with a daily low temperature average of 21°F. As a small donor to Hope's Dream Rescue & Sanctuary, a 501c3 nonprofit, I've become invested in this organization's ability to continue serving the voiceless cats in Centre County.

Led by a team of volunteers, Hope's is responsible for the spaying and neutering of almost 500 cats in this calendar year alone. Half of these cats were strays or feral. Hope's identifies colonies of feral and stray cats and works closely to recruit and identify colony caretakers who assist with their spay, neuter and protection efforts. Hope's is connected to six colonies, with their president, Lesa, (what's her last name? Is she Hope's president - surely not the cat colonies' president, which is what it says) feeding and caring for the cats at these locations.

As the cold months approach, Hope's is seeking funding for heated cat houses to keep outdoor cats warm through freezing temperatures. This grant would be used to purchase heated outdoor shelters for cat use throughout the winter. The heated aspect to these shelters removes the added expense and mess of replenishing straw to the common feral cat shelters Hope's sets up during the winter months. Elderly caretakers have struggled to maintain a regular cleaning and replenishing schedule to their makeshift heated shelters.

Farmland Preservation Artists now have art in Federal Taphouse restaurant

Farmland Preservation Artists of Central Pennsylvania have opened a gallery in a third restaurant. This one is in the Federal Taphouse, 130 South Fraser Street,, State College.

"We are a local business," general manager Jessica Wargo said, "and we want to support local artists. We hope our guests will not only enjoy the art, but buy some as well."

Composed of local artists, the Farmland Preservation Artists of Central Pennsylvania formed in late 2005. The group is a joint enterprise of the Art Alliance Of Central Pennsylvania and the Centre County Farmland Trust. Its mission is to promote the preservation and appreciation of farmland through the visual arts. A percentage of each sale goes to the Centre County Farmland Trust and the Art Alliance of Central Pennsylvania.

The artists work in a variety of media and

focus on the following goals:

- Portray the beauty of the rural landscape, local farms and the agricultural products they yield
- Highlight farm life, local food markets and economy
- Illustrate the issues facing farmers that affect our communities
- Increase support for farmland preservation through the exhibition and sale of art
- Promote the goals of the Art Alliance of Central Pennsylvania and the Centre County Farmland Trust

The farmland artists opened their first gallery in The Field at Toftrees in Patton Township and followed that with a gallery in the Bull Run Tap House in Lewisburg.



ROSEMARIE FIORE June 18, 2021 – January 30, 2022 HUB Gallery, HUB-Robeson Center

Rosemarie Fiore (b. 1972, New York, United States) lives and works in Bronx, NY, and is known for converting popular technology such as lawn mowers, cars, waffle irons, floor polishers, pinball machines, fireworks, and amusement park rides into painting machines.

February 2019 Fiore led a drawing machine workshop at Woskob Family Gallery's First Friday event and for undergraduate students in the School of Visual Arts. Prior to teaching at the Met, Fiore taught a similar program for fifteen years at the Brooklyn Museum.

Selected works from the past ten years of Fiore's practice and a video interview with the artist are on view in HUB Gallery through January 30, 2022. Rosemarie Fiore performed live on the HUB Lawn where she created three murals in celebration of the 20th anniversary of the Center for Sexual and Gener Diversity. Now on view in the HUB-Robeson Center, the murals *Smoke Painting #50, Smoke Painting #51, Smoke Painting #52* (from left to right) hang as an inspiration, remembrance, and celebration of being you and making your own mark at Penn State.

The murals will be on view for three years. A video documenting the smoke painting and student made tools used in the performances accompany the murals.




Roxanne Naydan at the State Theatre in November



Project Changing Places AWESOME AWARD GRANT WINNER SEPTEMBER 2021



Project Changing Places is a multimedia project involving the disciplines of theater, film, journalism and communication with the goal of closing the communication gap that has developed during the pandemic.

It begins with training in various methods of communication (non-violent communication, R.A.I.N., engendering compassion for self and others, and the social penetration theory of intimacy). Participants who represent a range of ages, beliefs, backgrounds and education get to know one another using these techniques in order to delve deeper into the interpersonal relationship and thus to create a sense of trust and intimacy for more disclosure.

The heart of this project is participatory communication, a dynamic, interactional and transformative process of dialogue that enables people to realize their full potential and engage in their own welfare. We will also utilize Applied Theatre, an umbrella term that involves a wide range of theatrical forms such as body expression, role play, improvisation, etc. After a series of workshops that include interviews and theater games designed to allow the participants to assemble material for the purpose of "character creation," each participant writes a monologue based on what was learned in the interviews. The written monologue is put into the rehearsal process to create the "character" of the other person. They will be "changing places" and presenting that perspective with personal truth, conviction and emotion.

Last is a public performance where the audience is witness to the stories of all participants. Theater of Witness is a form of testimonial performance by people sharing their personal and collective stories of suffering, transformation and peace. A talk-back with the "actors" follows the performance in order to learn about the process of "changing places" to promote peace and understanding within families, the community, the country and the world.

The entire process will be filmed.

Erica Quinn, *3 Dots Executive Director*

I joined 3 Dots as its executive director in April and have been thrilled to work with our community to amplify arts resources, initiatives and happenings across the region while contributing to a vibrant downtown. My commitment to community arts engagement spans experiences at the Dunedin Public Art Gallery of Dunedin, New Zealand; the Farmani Gallery of Brooklyn, NY; and the Huntingdon County Arts Council, as well as my current work on the board of directors of Huntingdon House.

Before coming to 3 Dots I served as lead faculty academic adviser and instructor of photography in Penn State's Stuckeman School, where I focused on issues of equity and inclusion in design education. I've taught artists and writers of all ages at Juniata College, the C. Barton McCann School of Art, and Stone Valley Community Charter School. I continue to teach a course at Penn State called photography for designers. My own artistic practice focuses on the meaning of place and space, integrating analog photography utilizing expired film, moving image and poetry. Excavating the complexities of memory and loss, this work articulates an occupation of the liminal.

I graduated from Juniata College in 2010 with a B.A. in photography and literature and earned my MFA in photography from the Pratt Institute in 2013. I love the back alleys of Lemont, the waterways of Pennsylvania, and finding and sharing meaning in public space the world over.


Austin Van Allen

I am an artist, art teacher and music teacher in State College, where I have lived, studied and worked for the past 12 years. My artwork represents two sides of the artist in me: freedom of expression and a need for control. During the pandemic of 2020 the need for control overwhelmed me; this, along with career challenges, affected my mental state and my art. I felt like I had to keep my thoughts and emotions bottled up inside and I lost my artistic inspiration. I was trapped, and I felt suffocated. I could no longer focus on hyper-realism, the ultimate expression of control. Instead, I started throwing paint onto paper. I used my hands, brushes, and cups of water. Painting became a release, and I slowly started to feel like myself again. The ink that is drawn over top of the paint is only meant to highlight the beauty of the watercolor, as well as to provide depth and texture. Even though the ink adds an element of control to my art, it is always reactionary and subservient to the freedom expressed by the watercolor paint. Instead of painting what I draw, I draw what I paint.

When I create my art, all the thoughts and feelings that I have to keep locked explode in bursts of brushstrokes, swirls of color, and masses of lines. There is a release of emotion, energy and passion that comes from casting off control, as well as an acceptance and appreciation of the imperfect result. Just like watercolor paint, life can offer something unique and beautiful when left to its own devices. I stopped trying to control everything, and somewhere in the mess I've started to find myself again.

Erin Bolger Welsh












Dalton Kendrick




Nicole Packard




Liza Johnson



She has been instructing pastels since the mid 80's, and organizing the Hameau Farm Studio Artist


